

COVID - 19

According to a UNESCO report, 1.6 billion children across 191 countries have been severely impacted by the temporary closure of the educational institutions.

In Nepal nearly 900,000 students are affected by the closure of the academic institutions. In upper Khumbu region of Solukhumbu district more than 2000 students are currently out of schools.

Disruptions to instructional time in the classroom can have a severe impact on a child's ability to learn. The longer marginalized children are out of school, the less likely they are to return. Children from the poorest households are the one to suffer the most. Being out of school also increases the risk of teenage pregnancy, sexual exploitation, child marriage, violence and other threats. Further, prolonged closures disrupt essential school-based services such as school feeding, and mental health and psychosocial support, and can cause stress and anxiety due to the loss of peer interaction and disrupted routines.

To minimize the risk to children's education, protection and wellbeing, Action for Nepal, Luklass Association in coordination with Local government of Khumbu, plans to reopen the 17 schools in three different phases following all the safety measures.





Action for Nepal and Luklass Association COVID RESPONSE

- Supported the local government education committee to put in place a COVID-19 plan for schools which sets out policies and protocols for schools to function safely
- Supported school management committees and PTA to put in place a COVID-19 management plan for the school. The plan included provision of how to catch up on the curriculum and provided necessary financial and technical support to equip schools with equipment to safely run the school.
- Conducted orientation program for teachers and parents on how to reopen the school safely
- Equipments provided to 17 Schools, equipments includes: Personal protective equipments to teachers, students, workbooks for students, COVID awareness materials, hand washing stations, soap and hand sanitizers for each classrooms. Cleaning and disinfecting materials, water and sanitation facilities were also provided.





Secondly, we believe every donor and organisation has a right to know where their money has been spent



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
